



Project Goals

- Improve access from the I-189/U.S. Route 7 interchange to the Burlington City Center District and Downtown waterfront area
- Improve circulation, mobility, and safety on local streets in the project study area
- Provide traffic relief in the southwestern quadrant of the City of Burlington
- Eliminate disruption to local neighborhoods and separate the local and through-traffic
- Reduce truck traffic from the local street network







Purpose of the LS DSEIS

- FHWA rescinded the 2010 Record of Decision for the 2009 FSEIS (October 11, 2019)
- Notice of Availability issued July 10, 2020
 - Limited in Scope of Issues
 - impacts to low-income and minority populations.
 - Limited to Pine Street, between Maple and Main Street
- Comments Due August 24, 2020

Environmental Justice

Environmental justice at FHWA means identifying and addressing disproportionately high and adverse effects of the agency's programs, policies, and activities on minority and low-income populations to achieve an equitable distribution of benefits and burdens.





Environmental Justice Analysis

EO 12898 – Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Low-Income and Minority Populations (February 11, 1994)

FHWA Guidance on Environmental Justice and NEPA (December 16, 2011)

FHWA Order 6640.23A – FHWA Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations (June 14, 2012)

<u>Methodology</u>

- 1. Identify the Study Area.
- Identify any minority and/or low-income populations.
- Evaluate if benefits and/or adverse effects on minority and/or low-income populations exist as a result of the project.
- 4. If adverse effects exist:
 - Identify and address whether there are any
 disproportionately high and adverse effects on minority
 and/or low-income populations after mitigation.
 - Compare adverse effects on other non-minority and/or higher-income populations

Data Sources

In conformance with FHWA Guidance:

- American Community Survey (ACS)
- 2014-2018 ACS 5-Year Estimates
 - Provides the most recent and reliable data at the census tract and block group level

Minority Populations

FHWA policy defines minority populations as:

- Black, African American or of African descent
- Hispanic or Latino origin
- Asian American
- American Indian
- Alaskan Native
- Native Hawaiian












Transit Signal Priority


Construction Mitigation Plan
